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RENNSPORT REUNION V

Beginning with a pre-dawn assault, 5 hardy members of Palmetto Region set out for the Left Coast on 24 Sept. to attend Rennsport Reunion 5. Held every 3-5 years after the original at Lime Rock Park, CT in 2001, with the last two at Laguna Seca Racetrack (Monterey, CA), Rennsport is a gathering of current and veteran Porsche racing cars and the drivers who campaigned them. With a crowd from all over the world of over 40,000 converging on the Monterey Peninsula, this year's event exceeded all expectations.

It was OVER THE TOP! Porsche AG and PCNA were there in full force with presentations by both current and past employees representing racing, engineering and product development presenting seminars to fulfill the wildest dreams of the dedicated Porschephiles in attendance. A theme common to all the presentations was the opportunity to engage with the presenters to have questions answered and present feedback.



Palmetto's Gang of Five was somewhat overwhelmed, as at any moment, there were several things we wanted to be doing (look! another 917(918, 919,550,959), there's Derek Bell (Jackie Ickx, Vic Elford, Patrick Long) and continuous racing in various classes. Apfelstrudel

Apfelstrudel (apple strudel) is a delicious pastry filled with apples flavoured with sugar, cinnamon, raisins and breadcrumbs – and has been popular since the 18th century. The delicate flakey pastry is made from an elastic dough, which is kneaded and stretched until it's as thin as phyllo pastry. The pastry is wrapped round and round the filling building up many layers, and then baked. It's served warm in slices sprinkled with powdered or icing sugar.

Ingredients

For the dough:

- 3 cups bread flour
- 1 egg
- 1/4 cup soft, unsalted butter
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup cold water
- Vegetable oil

- Bread flour

For the Filling:

- 3/4 cups coarse white bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup, melted unsalted butter
- 1 1/2 pounds, 14 ounces peeled, cored and thinly sliced Granny Smith, Pippin or other cooking apples
- 1/3 cup granulated sugar
- 3/4 cup dark raisins

To make the dough: Place the flour, egg, soft butter and salt in the bowl of an electric [mixer](#). Mixing with the dough

hook on low speed, add enough of the cold water to make a soft dough. [Knead](#) the dough in the electric mixer at medium speed until it is smooth and elastic, about 5 minutes. Form the dough into a ball and coat it with oil. Cover and let rest at room temperature for about 1 hour.

For the filling: To make the coarse bread crumbs, toast slices of white bread in the oven until [crisp](#), about 10 minutes. Break into pieces and place in a [food processor](#). [Pulse](#) the processor until the bread resembles large bread crumbs. In a saute pan, over medium heat, saute the bread crumbs in 1/4 cup of the melted butter until they are golden brown. Reserve the [sauteed bread crumbs](#) and the remaining melted butter separately. Combine the sliced [apples](#), [granulated sugar](#), raisins, [nuts](#), ground cinnamon and about half of the bread crumbs. Cut the firm butter into chunks and gently toss together with the apple mixture.



To Assemble: Cover a work surface approximately 4 feet by 4 feet with a clean piece of cloth. The cloth is used to facilitate stretching and rolling the dough. Make sure that the cloth is securely fastened to the table. [Dust](#) the cloth lightly with the flour. Place the rested dough in the center of the cloth. Using a rolling pin, roll the dough into a large, thin rectangle. When the dough is as thin as it will go with the [rolling pin](#), it is time to begin stretching and pulling the dough. To stretch and pull the dough, place your hands under the dough, and, using your thumbs and the back of your hand, gently begin pulling and stretching the [dough](#). Pull and stretch the dough until it is a rectangle approximately 3 1/2 feet by 2 1/2 feet. Be very careful when you are pulling and stretching not to tear the dough. After it is pulled to the proper size, let the dough relax on the table for a few minutes. There will be a thick edge around the edges, trim this away. You also want to trim off any parts of the dough that hang over the edges of the table. Place the apple filling next to the long edge of the dough closest to you. Form the filling into a thick log. Brush some of the reserved melted butter generously over the remainder of the dough. Sprinkle the remaining bread crumbs over the dough. Using the cloth to help lift the dough, roll the strudel as you would a [jelly roll](#), starting from the filling side. Place the [strudel](#), seam side down, in a horseshoe shape on a [sheet pan](#) lined with parchment paper. Brush the strudel with the last of the melted butter. Bake in a preheated 375 degree F oven for about 35 minutes, Remove the pan from the oven and cool. Slice the strudel into individual servings and serve either warm or at room temperature.




The recent Southern 356 Drive in Helen, Georgia, which was open to the first 185 people to sign up was a lot of fun. This was the third time it had been held and was an early sell out again, the 4 day event stretched from Thursday September 16th through the following Monday morning.



6 members from Charleston made the trip. I shared a ride with Fred Coward in his 1961, T5 Notchback Coupe. We joined up with Bruce Edge (62 Notchback) and Gary Raymond (1965 SC Coupe) in Columbia for the drive to Helen. Ken Richardson and Phillip Segui motored up in Ken's new Macan Turbo. Mike and Kaye Duck trailered their cabriolet to the event, as they had a football game to make and chose to depart a little early.

The event was headquartered in the Tanglewood cabins area, just outside of Helen, and the lodge, which was exclusively reserved for our group, served as a gathering place for meals, the 356 Registry Club Goodies Store, snacks, coffee, beer and wine. Everything was complementary, so it

was easy to just sit back and relax before and after the day's drives. In the evenings there was a Bluegrass live band and people gathered around the outdoor fire pits to talk. The weekend was great fun, as it was low key, well planned and offered all the driving time one could hope for in the mountain roads around Helen, Georgia.
